A creative soul and citizen of the world, Kusubayashi was born in Sao Paulo and raised in Japan. He experimented in various fields, including car manufacturing, apprenticing for a master kyoji (who mounts calligraphy), and restoring Asian art in Paris. Kusubayashi's interests eventually led him to Brooklyn where he worked for a

Japanese sculptor until 2009. The personal identity of Carlos Kusubayashi still remains a secret, not unlike his fragrances that need to be experienced, to truly be appreciated. We were able to make contact with Carlos, the brain behind the label to find out more about his clandestine perfumery. What's the secret behind the secret of A Lab on Fire? Why is everything such a mystery?

A Lab on Fire is a creative collective that includes perfumers, evaluators, a writer, a photographer and myself. We work together to make awesome fragrances, and each

one speaks for itself. It is important for us to credit the creator/nose of each fragrance, but that's all we need to convey. We started A Lab on Fire as an exercise in showcasing the best talents outside the box. There is no need for a "BRAND" or "MEism" Lab on Fire.

The good thing about not letting too much information out is that I don't waste time on things that are not essential to us, and so we can stay focused on our agenda. I can

skip the attention of the media entirely. The downside could be that the opportunities for media exposure are limited, and it takes more time to develop strong distribution networks for the products. In Europe I've just started with Intertrade.



I've always liked what Hedi Slimane does, including his photography. I also adore

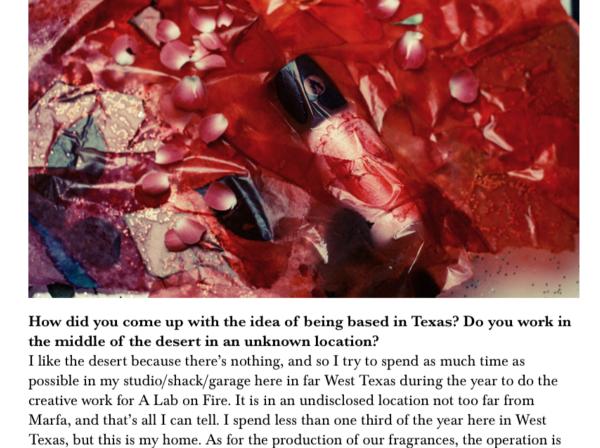

I don't like routine – I like to go with the flow, except for putting on a t-shirt and jeans before work, there is one thing I always try to do wherever I am - whether that is in the desert of West Texas, on the rough streets of Brooklyn, or somewhere far from the States – that is to run at dawn. It takes the edge off, leaving me calm and focused during the day.



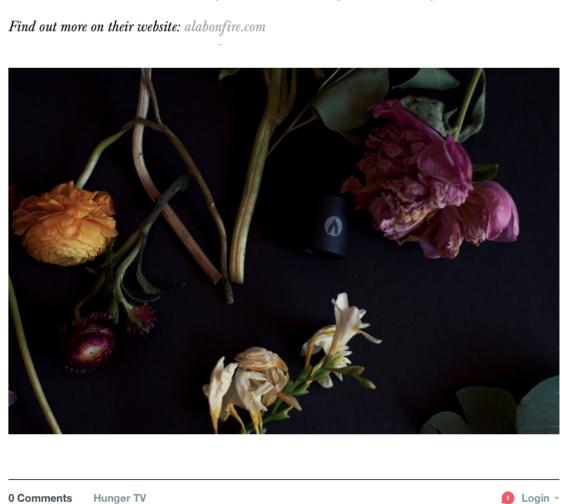
